RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1 The Society shall be called the "AYTON AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY."
- 2 That no person will be allowed to compete whose subscription for the current year has not been paid; the Annual Subscription for Class I. will be 5s, and 2s for Class II., which shall be due on the first week of June; and to entitle Members to exhibit, their subscriptions must be paid during the first week of August.
- 3 Every article will be received at the door of the Volunteer Hall by the Arranging Committee, who will be in attendance at Half-past Eight o'Clock A.M., and no article for competition will be received after Ten o'Clock A.M.
- 4 Members intending to compete shall give notice thereof to the Secretary, at least three clear days before the day of the show, with a list of articles for competition.
- 5 All articles for competition must be accompanied by a separate Sealed Envelope, addressed to the Secretary, and containing the following:- "I declare that all the articles accompanying this letter were grown by me; and have been in my possession for at least two months."

- That in all cases where more than one plant or cut flower is required the collection must consist of dissimilar varieties, unless otherwise specified. Competitors must put the number of the prize that they compete for on the cover of the Sealed Envelope of the article.
- Members who subscribe 2s. are entitled to an admission ticket on the day of the show; those who subscribe 5s. are entitled to two tickets; and those who subscribe 10s. and upwards are entitled to three tickets. Non-members will be admitted between the hours of One and Three, on payment of 1s.; from Three to Five, 6d. each; and from Six to Eight, 3d. each. School children admitted between the hours of Five and Six on payment of 1d. each.
- 8 No competitor shall compete for more than one place in each stand in any Class; and no competitor shall exhibit more than the required quantity of any article.
- 9 Competitors must reside within the parishes of Ayton, Coldingham (partly), Eyemouth, Foulden, or Mordington.
- 10 The Committee have it in their power to visit Members' gardens within two months of the show, and can withhold all prizes taken by any competitor who may have used deception.
- 11 The Members of Committee have power to receive Subscriptions, which are to be handed over to the Treasurer.
- 12 No article can be removed from the Hall before Eight o'Clock P.M. All Prizes will be paid on the show day between the hours of Three and Four P.M.

The Annual Meeting of the Society will be held on the 9th September, 1881, at 8 o'Clock P.M., in the Volunteer Hall, Ayton.
